1 WELCOME AND APOLOGIES

No apologies had been received.

2 APPROVAL OF MINUTES, MATTERS ARISING AND DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

The minutes of the previous Meeting were approved. No action points were identified other than those noted elsewhere on the agenda.

Matters arising and updates noted as follows:

- Fundraising an email relating to the mini-meeting of the Parent Council was noted as being due for circulation following this meeting.
- West Edinburgh school plan a potential date for the next meeting had been received on the day of the meeting.
- There are still vacancies for a Secretary, Treasurer and Minute Taker no expressions of interest received since the last meeting.

Declarations of Interest – In relation to potential discussions regarding the planned industrial action by teachers, John McLeod declared an interest as an employed Officer with the Educational Institute of Scotland.

3 CRAIGMOUNT UPDATE

S2 Pupils (Isobel and Ollie) updated the Parent Council on the following matters:

- Developing Young Workforce open evening

- S1 S3 Leadership workshop
- Debating successes
- Highlights of the Christmas events held across the school.

CM advised that the senior phase prelims had been completed as planned. Tracking reports were currently being prepared. Further classroom-based assessments are being planned to provide a second update on student progress and cover areas of curriculum which had not been reached by December. It was confirmed that this will represent a change from last year. A second round of formal assessments is not required for SQA purposes this year as there is more certainty over the final exams taking place as scheduled.

There was a question raised regarding Nat 5 English where students had been informed there would be a second formal assessment. CM agreed to clarify with the department and provide feedback to the questioner.

4 WELLBEING CENSUS - APRIL 2022

Karen Coull provided a summary of the responses to the Scottish Government student wellbeing census.

It was noted that the full report was very detailed. Highlights had been picked out for the presentation and the slides would be shared with the Chair following the meeting.

Key points as follows:

- Pleasing level of participation. Only 2.5% opted out.
- 15% of respondents suggested they had been bullied but only half had reported their experience. KC noted that this was prior to a major piece of work on anti-bullying being done in the school.
- In response to a question regarding the questions in relation to sexual activity and concerns in this area, KC advised that Pupil Support, assisted by Youth Agency will work with the school on options for further support.
- Noted that there are no comparisons with the past (which might, for example, have shown a 'COVID effect') as this is the first time the census has been undertaken in this form.
- There is no benchmarking against other schools. There is however, aggregate figures for CEC schools in aggregate and Craigmount has no significant variance from these figures.
- It is planned to run the census again in 2 years time.

5. Trips and Activities

Craig Beattie gave an update on aspects of planning for future trips and activities within the school.

- S1 Venture to be moved from the Autumn to May. In the autumn there will be some kind of 'Epic Day' to help develop teamworking amongst the new S1 cohort.
- In order to assist with equity and the affordability of the events programme, it is hope that a 3 year timetable will be made available to parents early in S1 so they can budget for trips.

- There will be a phasing back in of curricular trips, subject to CEC policy and their insurance restrictions.
- Noted that short trips are proving easier than 'Up North' residential trips as there is an issue in finding 'approved contractors' who have all of the appropriate risk assessments in place.

6. Industrial Action

Health and Safety consideration meant that the SSTA/NASUWT strike day resulted in a second closure for the School.

CM noted that the school would be closed on 11 January and 25 January due to strike action.

Those in receipt of free school meals will receive a payment rather than being required to come in.

7. Treasurers' Report

It was noted that there was £3,982 in the main account after paying out £728 for netball posts etc.

This will fall after the 'wish-list' items are agreed and paid for.

It was noted that the 200 club will be ending in February. Remaining funds will be disbursed on 'wish list' items.

8. Fundraising

GH reported that this is a really difficult time for grant funding, due to cost of living crisis etc.

Currently looking at local businesses instead.

Nothing new to report at this time.

9. AOB

The Chair announced that Phil Black had advised that he would be formally stepping down from the Parent Council. Thanks from the Council members and from CM were noted.

A query was raised about the prevalence of senior pupils vaping in the toilets with members reporting instances of younger pupils avoiding the toilets at breaks. CM noted that the school were aware of the issue and were checking the toilets regularly.

Related to the above, there was a discussion regarding the ability of students to get out of class as required for medical reasons, to get water and to go to the toilet outwith break times. It was noted that there was ongoing consideration of these matters within the Senior Leadership team.



Will there be exam leave during formal assessments? To maximise time in class with teachers a focus on learning, teaching and assessment, means there will be no exam until the actual SQA exams. Pupils should follow their timetable as normal. There may be a requirement for class time to be extended to accommodate longer papers this is noted on the schedule. 

Health & Wellbeing Census 2021-2022

The Census aimed to find out about the health and wellbeing of children and young people in local areas

- 90% believe getting an education is important to them
- The majority feel safe in the area where they live and it is a good place to live
- 50% think they will go to university when they leave Craigmount, 30% don't know what they will do
- 50% feel pressured (stressed) by the school work they have to do

- 95% have one good friend or more
- S1-3 only the majority have friends who will help if needed, and would help friends if they were being bullied
- S1-3 only 15% have been bullied in the last year. Of these, 65% were at school, 15% online 25% other. 45% reported the bulling 45% didn't.
- 60% feel that they will be OK even if they are having a difficult time
- 55% feel confident to speak up in class, ask questions, share there opinion
- 45% feel their body and the way they look affects how they feel about themself

- 65% are in bed before 11am on a school night, 15% getting less than 5 hours sleep per night
- 40% don't have breakfast on a school day
- All have access to the internet, spending 1-7 hours a day on devices –
 gaming, music, social media
- 30% tried to spend less time on social media but failed

- 80% have enough money to do the same things as my friends
- Minority of S3,5,6 spend money on gambling
- S2 & S4 only 95% don't smoke, 90% don't vape, 65% never drink
- S4-6 only 20% have a boyfriend/girlfriend
- S4-6 only 60% have had no sexual experience, the majority who have find it easy to say no to having sexual experiences they don't want

Areas to consider moving forward

- Continue to work in partnership with Skills Development Scotland to support all young people in what their positive destination will be
- Data on bullying used for equalities video and in implementation of new policy
- Re-establish breakfast club
- Through Technology Tuesdays continue to support use of devices now we have 1:1
 iPads
- Pupil Support Leaders use census data in planning PSE curriculum
- Continue to work with Pupil Support and our partners to support wellbeing
- Develop our relationship with Youth Agency to extend our wellbeing supports

How does it work at Craigmount?

- All trips at Craigmount need approval
- Start by completing proposal form > <u>Proposal form</u>
- Important for costings, logistics, identifying barriers and ensuring equity
- Proposal form is sent to SLT for approval
- Paperwork then completed in conjunction with Council's excursion policy
- Depending on category of trip, there is different process to be followed
- All trips need risk assessed and all trips require students to have medical information (KIC Forms)







Brief overview of CEC Excursions Policy

- 4 Categories of Trips
- Category 1 Normal part of school day, local trip, within school hours (Low risk)
- Category 2 Not part of normal day, extends school hours, slightly further afield
- Category 3 CEC approved provider trip. Adventurous activities but non residential
- Category 4 Residential trips, Overseas trips, adventurous activities that are not on
 CEC approved provider list
- Category 4 (and some category 3) trips require Group Leader training







Trips and Activities pre-pandemic – Student Perspective

- Residential excursions at various points throughout year (Venture plus overseas trips)
- Overseas Trips (Trenches, New York trip, Ski trip)
- Trips linked to curriculum but also additional trips
- Week of Wellbeing for S1-3
- Ran over 3 days in May Tried to coincide with May Holiday/Change of timetable
- Big trips during same week but over longer period
- All students selected 3 day trips or a 'Big trip'
- Over 50 different options to choose from







Week of Wellbeing pre-pandemic

- Students would sign up to big trips in Autumn (September October)
- Those not doing big trips would sign up to day trips in January
- Pick 5 options and would get 3 from this list
- After booking was closed at end of January, each student would discover their 3 day trips
- Students would be given an invoice and payment system would then open
- Students often changed their mind at this stage for variety of reasons
- Logistical challenge to then re-book and re-cost individual trips and transport







Staff/School Perspective

- Big trips organised and planned in Autumn of the academic year
- Letters to parents/carers about big trips
- Meetings held to gain interest, confirm numbers and begin official planning
- Paperwork then completed and payment plans set up (Oct Apr at best)
- Day trips advertised in January/February
- Students choose through online booking system (Online catalogue used)
- Students then coursed to help deliver 3 of their 5 options
- Adjustments then made after 3 day trips confirmed (Friends, financial, other)
- Payment plans begin (Further adjustments made based on this)

Parent Perspective

- A parent with 2 children at Craigmount (2 years apart in age) could conceivably end up paying £10,300 to ensure their children get the same experience across their first 3 years at Craigmount
- They could also face paying £1900 in the space of 8 months to ensure their S1 experience is fulfilled.
- This does not take in to account the other additional costs that happen throughout the year or the sporadic trips that may pop up

First WOW since Covid-19

- Epic days for S1-S3
- S1 all taken to Beecraigs country park
- A range of activities organised (Cycling, Mountain biking, scavenger hunts, bbq etc)
- S2 and S3 had CEC led 'Epic Days' at Bonaly scout camp
- S2/3 were split across 4 days. Varied experience of activities.
- Some led by qualified instructors and some led by CHS staff
- Fee for Epic Days £25

What will things look like this year?

- A return to trips happening (Already had over 50 trips out including DofE and a CAT 4 residential to Islay).
- A more substantial WOW programme that is purposeful and equitable.
- S1 and S2 to have an Epic Day experience Scaled up from last year
- S3 to get a bigger trip opportunity Theme park visit, Historical visit, 'One Day wonder'.
- Students and staff have been consulted around the future offering for WOW.




What will things look like next year?

What will WOW 2024 look like?

- S1 residential trip moves to May time. Venture experience.
- S1 Epic day or equivalent in Autumn to help with getting to know peers
- S2 then partake in a 'one day wonder' style day trip.
- S3 have an opportunity to go on a residential or overseas trip.
- S3 trips are mapped out in advance and could be a variety of domestic and overseas opportunities. Examples could include – Trenches trip, Water sports adventure trips, Cultural and sightseeing trips, Food tours and more.
- Would also include non-residential trips which gave purposeful experiences at low/no cost closer to home.

- You know what the first 3 years may look like. Element of surprise removed.
- Can plan in advance for this and be prepared to support. School is better positioned to support.
