This year, the pandemic era adjustments to courses were finally dropped. This may be the reason why attainment levels dropped so drastically compared to the last 5 years. However, statistics also show a national drop compared to 2019, the year before the disruption of the COVID Pandemic.


It's important to note that these are National statistics and don't reflect Craigmount High School's attainment. We reached out to Depute Headteacher Scott Pye for some insight:

"Reflecting on the results of pupils at Craigmount in the exam diet of 2024 fills me with great pride. So many pupils have achieved fantastic sets of qualifications that have given them opportunities to go into employment, college, university and apprenticeships. We now have a wider range of qualifications on offer at Craigmount, and through that we are creating more appropriate pathways than ever, for pupils who stay on at school and continue to develop their skills and qualifications in the senior phase. Our careers events and links with industry have increased in recent years and continue to do so, allowing pupils to gain insight into the range of career options locally, nationally and exist internationally. It is an exciting time in schools and it is clear to see that pupils are really enjoy their studies and gaining lots from them."

There was a particularly affected subject this year; Higher History. The 2024 pass rate for Higher History was 65.7%, a 13% drop from last year. The SQA has blamed a "drop in exam performance" for these results, however, we reached out to Craigmount History teacher Mr Galloway for his opinion, "We have seen the national discussions around the Higher History results this year and at this moment, teachers know as much as the pupils. However, we are super proud of how Craigmount performed, and the hard work students put in which was reflected in a solid set of results"

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

Together, as a PAG, we are to decide which charities to fundraise for. We also plan to create a food bank again for people to donate to during Christmas time."

Maya: "We are also in discussion of having a Charity Night in which we pick a charity we are passionate about and raise awareness about it and fundraise for it."

The Fringe is one of the world's greatest celebrations of art and culture, with thousands of tourists flocking to Edinburgh's historic streets to indulge in a wide variety of unforgettable shows.

This year, the Fringe's website boasts over four thousand performances! Amidst renowned comedians and inspiring performers are two of our very own: Craigmount students.

Hannah Kelly (S3) and Tara Boyton (S5), who some readers may remember from High School Musical, both featured in Captivate Theatre's All Shook Up, a jukebox musical featuring Elvis Presley's iconic songs.

Hannah played Lorraine, a young girl in the fifties caught in the grip of forbidden love, and has been with Captivate for around a year.

Having been in School of Rock last year, Hannah values the way the Fringe strengthens the bond between her and her friends, "It's an experience I can share with them, and we get to create new memories together."

"You get a lot of foreigners," agreed the young star, "I've been walking out (of a show) before and been complimented by someone with an American accent, it's a really strange experience." "With fringe crowds, you tend to get a lot more people who don't know the people in the shows," Tara, who plays Sylvia, says, "and it was a smaller venue compared to some other shows I've done so it feels more intimate."



The Fringe is a great starting point for young people looking to become stars. Icons like Robin Williams and Alan Rickman gained recognition by taking part in Fringe shows. Who knows, maybe Hannah and Tara will follow suit!




