What is UCAS?

UCAS is an **independent charity** providing information, advice and admissions services. We're there to help people **discover** what their next step might be.

UCAS does:

- provide information, advice, and support
- process applications
- complete fraud and verification checks
- take part in education sector engagement

UCAS doesn't:

- make decisions or offers
- set entry requirements
- advise on finance
- advise on immigration or visas

What the pupil does?

- Register with UCAS they should have done this in PSE/college class.
- Work through sections in their hub.
- Research courses, including entry requirements, to select their 5 most appropriate course.
- Write and submit their personal statement.
- Request 1 or 2 referees.
- Pay for application process £28.50.
- When all sections are complete submit, received by school who will check and send.



There is a maximum of **five** choices and choice restrictions may apply. A maximum of **four** courses from medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine or veterinary science, and either the University of Oxford OR the University of Cambridge).

Once all choices are added they must mark the section as complete to be able to submit.

Choices do not need to be added in any preference order. Universities / colleges can only see where else they've applied once they've made their offer and they've decided whether to accept them as their firm or insurance choice.



You can add up to 5 choices to your application. You can change your choices until you send your application to us. All sections must be marked as complete before you can send your application to us.

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





 - Electronic feedback will have been given on first draft.
- Final Application to be submitted to school: Wednesday October 9th 2024

- Personal Statement first draft: Past
 - You may wish another teacher to support with your personal statement this can be arranged on an individual basis if the teacher is able to help
- Personal Statement second draft: Friday 25th October 2024
 - Electronic feedback will have been given on first draft and second draft
- Final Application to be submitted to school: Friday December 6th 2024

The personal statement

- The only chance to market themselves as an individual
- The same for all of their choices
- A maximum of 4,000 characters, or 47 lines
- A minimum of 1,000 characters
- X There isn't a spelling or grammar check
- No formatting allowed

UCAS' similarity detection service: every personal statement is run through software to check for plagiarism.










Reference

- A reference is made up of 3 sections
 - Establishment Details
 - Extenuating Circumstances (optional)
 - Other Supportive Information
- Pupils will be required to <u>ask</u> a maximum of 2 staff members to provide supporting evidence for your UCAS reference
- Their referee(s) should be someone who knows them academically and can share supporting information relevant to the courses they are applying for.
- Pupils must ask their referees if they are willing to do this and then
 populate their names into the form which they have access to on TEAMS.

Completing the UCAS application





- Once all decisions have been received, pupils will make a reply and confirm their choices.
- If they choose a conditional offer as their firm choice, they have the option to add an optional insurance choice.

If they choose an unconditional offer as their firm choice, they cannot have an insurance choice.

All other offers will be declined offers, underneath the Firm choice.

Choosing the right place for you

- Style from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside – it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.

Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?



SAAS

We deliver free online application workshops throughout the year, providing valuable information to school leavers and students on the funding available for Higher Education courses. Open to students, parents and carers, the Funding Awareness team walk you through the application process and provide an opportunity for attendees to ask any.



LEAPS – Eligibility

- student who is first generation in family to apply to higher education or whose parents do not already have a degree. This includes students whose parents may have briefly participated in higher education but did not achieve a degree.
- student from a low income background. (For instance where a student is entitled to EMA, free meals in school, or where the family is entitled to a benefit such as Universal Credit).
- student who is care experienced. (By this we mean where a student has been, or is currently, in care. For instance, this may have been in a formal setting such as looked after at home, adoption or foster care, or it may have been in an informal setting such as kinship care and living with a relative who is not their mum or dad.)
- student who is estranged. (By this we mean a young person who currently has little or no contact with either of their parents and/or their legal guardian
- student who is a young carer. (By this we mean a young person who cares, unpaid, for a friend or family member who due to illness, frailty, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction cannot cope without their support.)
- student who lives in one of Scotland's 20% most disadvantaged communities as defined by the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD20).

LEAPS – Eligibility

- Information about LEAPS has been shared with pupils and they should have let the school know if they believe they are leaps eligible.
- Those who have informed the school have and must fill out this LEAPS Survey: <u>LEAPS (leapssurvey.org)</u>
- They will attend a face-to-face interview in school in November early applications over the phone.
- If they are confirmed LEAPS eligible this will be reflected in their teacher reference.
