To celebrate their 100th anniversary, the National Library of Scotland has decided to launch the Love Your Library campaign, with an exhibition called 'Dear Library' as a love letter to libraries across Scotland.



As part of the campaign, communities have been encouraged to show support for their local libraries, so we here at The Squawk have decided to showcase the importance of our libraries. the local In Craigmount area, we have two local libraries - Drum Brae and Corstorphine - alongside our very own school library.

Craigmount library is organised by the brilliant Mr Hume who has worked throughout a number of libraries in Edinburgh before coming to Craigmount in the spring of 2018. He keeps the library up to date with new and

diverse books and helps students find books that appeal to them.

Junior students are able to visit the library during periods of English, allowing them to enhance learning and take a break from the classroom environment.

But the library is also a place to hang out and chill during break. lunch and study periods. It's place a community for people who may feel anxious with the chaos of the noise and concourse. Plus, it hosts numerous clubs and events such as junior debating and book club at lunchtimes.

Mr Hume tries to cater to everyone in the school to properly reflect the wider community, with an ethos of making sure that everyone is welcomed and respected. He does this by creating monthly displays to celebrate and raise awareness of certain topics

and by making sure that the library is a safe and comfortable place for everyone.

For sixth years especially, the library provides a grounding point for students. Whether it's a place to finish up last minute homework or a place to relax when school is getting a bit serious. The library is open at lunch for the sixth years, allowing students to have a break from the buzz of the concourse.

So, as the Valentines' events conclude for this year, think about libraries and other spaces that make your community what it is. Take out a new book, or simply have a chat with a librarian.





shadow Generations was released in 2024 alongside a remaster of Sonic Generations. Sonic Generations is a well made game but Shadow Generations was by far the highlight of that package which is why I'll be focussing on it for this review. The game explores Shadow's past, replacing the vibrant and upbeat tone of Sonic Generations with **EDGE**.

The gameplay is essentially an evolution of the 2022 video game Sonic Frontiers.

It features a very agile Shadow who moves with ease at high

speeds. This is complimented by his Doom Powers which range from throwing projectiles, to stopping time, to turning into a goo squid thing, to surfing on water and, at the very end of the game, you unlock the ability to sprout wings and soar through the sky. This introduces a new level of coolness to Shadow's character and elevates levels by allowing you to take advantage of his powers in interesting and unique ways.

Speaking of which, levels in Shadow Gens are either entirely 2D or entirely 3D with no in between! They make good use

of the Doom Powers Shadow's moves to allow for shortcuts, skips and finding collectibles; power ups rinboxes hidden behind certain pathways. This makes the game incredibly rewarding and allows you to play it over and over again to get better at the levels and figure out how to speed-run them. The game's final stage makes a particularly fantastic use of the Doom Wings by giving you lots of alternate pathways that would be inaccessible on foot, and boasting some truly awesome visuals.

'Shadow Generations was by far, the highlight...'

The levels are incredibly fun, with lots of memorable storylines and fun segments, including some which give you a glimpse of Radical Highway, the game's final stage, where Black Doom, the game's antagonist, is introduced. In these sequences, Doom bends the world around you, letting you slide down



buildings and watch as roads warp and bend. It's awesome, (the first few times anyways) and has a lot of the same high quality design as the main segments.

The DLC stage, which is set in Tokyo like the third Sonic movie, has a similar focus on spectacle, with multiple cutscenes. This can get a little grating on repeats, but the action itself is incredibly well done.

Levels aren't the only gameplay available. White Space, an ingame location, is fully explorable in 3D, with goodies (songs you

can listen to during the levels, Concept Art, journal entries...) hidden at every turn, and lots of platforming challenges scattered throughout, including a few that make use of your Doom Powers!

'What's a good story without a little conflict?'

The game is more plot-focused compared to many of the other Sonic games released recently. There's a story refresher of Shadow's tragic backstory in the menu which I recommend going through. It's not peak cinema by any means, but it serves its purpose.

And what's a good story without a little conflict? After a few levels,

Shadow usually finds himself face to face with one of his foes from previous games and these battles are the absolute highlights of the game. These fights provide more of a challenge than your typical baddie while also being over top ridiculous the fun. impressive even on replay, and complimented by some kickass vocal tunes from Crush 40.


LUNAR NEW YEAR 2025
